Nancie Rideout Sets Record

A new world record was established, two were tied and seven meet records were broken or tied as 107 of the country's best water skiers competed for national titles at the 1957 National Water Ski Championships at San Diego, Calif., August 23, 24 and 25.

Nancie Rideout, Winter Haven, Fla., jumped 76 feet on her third and final attempt to set a new world and meet record in the women's division. Nancie's winning leap topped by four feet the old record established two weeks earlier by Mrs. Leah Marie Atkins, Birmingham, Ala., at the Southeast Regional tournament.

Mrs. Atkins, however, took firsts in slalom and tricks and seventh in jumping with a 56-footer to win the 1957 national overall women's championship. Nancie placed second in overall rankings by placing third in slalom and eighth in tricks.

Joe Cash, also of Winter Haven, set a new meet record and tied the world record jump of 126 feet in the men's division, while Hal Roberts, San Diego, competing in the veterans' division, set a new meet record and tied the world record for veterans with a 78-footer.

Charles Stearns, Bellflower, Calif., claimed the men's overall title by winning the slalom, placing second in tricks and sailing 106 feet for fifth in jumping. Cash followed Stearns in overall rankings with a third in tricks and a tie for tenth in the slalom.

In the boys' competition, Roger Ray of Winter Haven won overall honors by placing first in jumping and second in tricks and slalom.

The new girls' champion is Vicki Van Hook, Long Beach, Calif., who won the tricks title and took runner-up honors in the slalom and jumping. Vicki's best

jump, a 63-footer, tied the meet record.

Henry Holmes, West Palm Beach, Fla., compiled enough points by winning the slalom, taking third in tricks and landing in seventh place in jumping to win the national championship in the veterans' competition.

Other new meet records were established by Sally Morris, McOueeney, Texas, who jumped 67 feet in the girls' division; Wally Albright, Thermal, Calif., who compiled a new meet mark of 1,610 points in men's tricks and Mike Amsbry, Orange, Calif.,

whose 1,648 points in boys' tricks has never been equaled.

Vicki Van Hook teamed with Mike Amsbry to win the mixed doubles competition.

The Long Beach (Calif.) Boat and Ski Club successfully defended the national team championship it won at the nationals last year at La Porte, Ind. The California club compiled 8,667 points in retaining the traveling governor's team trophy, more than twice as many points as won by

the second-place team, Cypress Gardens Ski Club.

An estimated 15,000 spectators lined the banks of the U.S. Naval Training Center estuary during the three-day event to watch skiers from 17 states, 55 cities, compete for national water ski championships. The event was sanctioned by the American Water Ski Association and cosponsored by the San Diego Junior Chamber of Commerce and San Diego Speedboat and Ski Club.



Joe Mueller made a 105 foot leap in the men's division of the Lake Austin Invitational Open at Lake Austin Lodges, Austin, Texas, to be one of three to exceed the century mark in this tournament. Leroy Herren who jumped 101 feet, was placed second with 242 points while Charles Nash, also leaping 101 feet, was penalized 10 points on form and was placed third with 232 points. Joe Mueller also swept through the tricks with 680 points in that event for first place and made three perfect runs through the slalom course for first place. Johnny Joseph was second in slalom while Charlie Nash placed second in tricks.

Clayton Gatterdam's 495 points won the veterans' tricks event and his 64 foot jump was tops in that contest. Gatterdam was second in the slalom. Richard Sperry was the slalom winner with one perfect run and 10 misses in his second try at the buoys.

Art Fox, who has been collecting a mantle full of trophies this summer, won all three events in the boys' division. Art had 650 points in tricks, an 86 foot jump, made three perfect runs and on the fourth try only dropped three buoys.

Sally Morris won the girls' tricks contest with 335 points and was second in jumping with a 47 foot leap. She was also second in the slalom, making one perfect run, dropping six buoys on the second run and five on the third run. First place in the slalom went to Nancy Williams, who did not enter the other two events.

Elayne Roper Baker, whose trophies take up more space than a house full of relatives, ran easily through the Women's Division winning the tricks event with 645 points, scoring a 60 foot jump and making two perfect runs through the slalom course.

Dr. Thomas Daly was the top veteran trick skier with 446 points. Bill Martin had a veterans' jump of 65 feet good for the title in that event, while Bill McClendon missed two buoys to win the veterans' slalom.

Nancie Rideout, jumping 66 feet, won the women's division jumping contest with Connie Derr, who placed first in slalom, running third and Mary Ann Moenert, who was first in tricks, placing second in jumping.
