

From the Mailbox

Dear Hugo:

The Seattle Water Ski Association had its final program in a 16-week television series on water skiing last evening and Rod Preston and John Peterson of Seattle, and the crew of KTVW, deserve credit for carrying on an interesting and informative series with plenty of action movies and news about local skiing. I was a guest on the windup show and had a great time.

Chuck Tee, of Everett, has a weekly show in the midafternoon on Channel 4, KOMO, and he is doing an excellent job of promoting safety in swimming and water skiing. Chuck is Hank Fetcher's son-in-law and is a member of the Lake Stevens Water Ski Club.

The University of Washington and this writer have been cooperating on a ½-hour weekly show, 7:30 p.m. on Mondays, in which we are trying to put over the basic fundamentals of water skiing. We have had excellent response. We use movies (all slow motion) and a lecture discussion type of instruction that seems to get the points across. We stress safety and stick closely to the AWSA and OBC rules of skiing and boat safety. I think this is the first television course given by an accredited college concerned with water skiing.

We have two slalom courses set up in the Northwest, one at Lake Stevens and another on Lake Sammamish, 10 miles east of Seattle. We plan several non-sanctioned slalom meets this Summer.

Canada will have two meets nearby open to U.S. citizens: The Western Canadian Open, Victoria, B.C., July 25-27; and the National Canadian Open, August 11-13, at Kelowna, B.C. We should have good turnouts at both meets from U.S. residents.

Our meet is shaping up, with final approval for the use of Green Lake given this week. We will run a two-day meet and will

run novices with regular sanctioned skiers, scoring separately. The Seattle Yacht Club, where the famous Gold Cup resides, will be the location of the banquet. Rod Sampson and Frank Countner, the cochairman, have had a little bad luck with their boat. It blew up and burned to the water line just as they launched it so they are boatless, but will still run the meet.

Sirs:

During the past three years, THE WATER SKIER has come out with several excellent articles concerning various methods of calculating jumps, getting more spring into a jump, etc., all of which have been designed to help skiers come a bit closer to the "perfect jump."

Thus far, however, I believe I am the only person foolhardy enough to venture a guess on the exact distance the "perfect jump" would cover. This I did in 1956 in my book, "Water Skiing For All." My estimate, considering the jump was made under AWSA regulations, was 150 feet.

Now it seems the prediction was, to put it mildly, not quite accurate. I have read the articles and formulas for calculating jumps in back issues of THE WATER SKIER, boned up on my mathematics, worn three pencils down to their erasers and found that the "perfect jump" will cover a distance of 187 feet.

Georgia Plays Host To 1958 National Tourney

An unprecedented shattering of world and tournament water ski records is predicted as the nation's top water skiers converge on Pine Mountain, Ga., for the 1958 National Water Ski Tournament, to be held August 22 through 24. Staged on beautiful Robin Lake, at the world famous Ida Cason Callaway Gardens, this 16th annual renewal of America's top water sports competition will determine the national champion skiers in flve divisions and four events.

Hot competition is expected in all events—jumping, slalom, tricks and overall—because the recent phenomenal growth of water skiing as a sport has produced a brilliant crop of eager young skiers. Youngsters who have come up through local competition and the regional tournaments are rarin' for shots at the national crowns.

At the same time, national champions

of last year, all record-setters in their own rights, will be back to defend their titles against the onslaughts of the newcomers.

The Site

The setting for the 1958 Nationals is just as outstanding as the event itself. Located 30 miles north of Columbus, Ga., the 2,500-acre Ida Cason Callaway Gardens is among the top tourist recreational and horticultural attractions in the country. Robin Lake, at the Gardens, is the world's largest manmade lake skirted by a sand beach. As many as 15,000 persons will have a clear view of each event staged on the lake from the beach.

It should be noted that the address of the Gardens is Pine Mountain, Ga. Last Winter the town of Chipley changed its name to Pine Mountain, and hence, the change in the address of the Gardens.

Beautiful Robin Lake, the site of the 1958 National Water Ski Championships, has been called the world's largest manmade lake. The beach will accommodate 15,000 persons.



How to Qualify

To enter an event in the 1958 Nationals, a skier must be a member of the American Water Ski Association and must have in his possession an official tournament qualification card properly filled out. Skiers must also be residents of the United States for the six months immediately preceding Regional Tournaments in which they qualified.

Entrants will be selected according to corresponding events in prior National and Regional Tournaments. A skier may also qualify by virtue of "exceptional performance" in sanctioned tournaments during the same year.

In order to enter an event in the National meet, the skier must have placed among the first five in that event in last year's national, among the first four two years ago, or among the first three finishers three years ago. Or he can have placed among the first five in a regional tournament this year, among the first three last year, or among the first two, two years ago.

The Governor's Trophy

This year there has been a major change in the awarding of the Governor's Trophy, a handsome silver trophy which in the past was presented to the team scoring the greatest number of points. The AWSA Tournament Committee voted to award the cup at the 1958 Nationals to the region compiling the most points on a basis of 10, 9, 8, 7, 6, etc., points being awarded the first 10 places in each event.

Thus the Governor's Trophy will in the future signify the region whose skiers compile the highest number of points in the tourney.

Trophies

Bo Callaway, Executive Director of the Ida Cason Callaway Gardens, has announced that trophies awarded at the 1958 Nationals will be Silver. The decision to award Silver in place of the customary trophies was based on a survey of the winners of trophies at last year's nationals, who were overwhelmingly in favor of Silver.

Entry Blanks

Entry blanks for the 1958 Nationals will be available at all regional tournaments. In addition, elsewhere in this edition of THE WATER SKIER, an official entry blank is printed on a page that may be clipped and mailed.

Water skiing has always been a top sport at the Ida Cason Callaway Gardens, which has served as host to a number of local and regional tournaments in the past.



Champs To Defend Crowns

A capsule glance at the 1957 National Tournament gives some indication of the battles and skirmishes that may be expected to occur at the 1958 tourney's battleground.

If this year's tournament follows the pattern set at the nationals over the last couple of years, the waters of Robin Lake should be littered with crushed and broken records and tarnished championship crowns.

Last year, for an example, 14 out of 20 possible championship defenses were made. Only five were successful. And as an indication of the competition that's found at the national, for the first time in 16 years, there was only one double winner.

The double-crowned champ was Mrs. Leah Marie Atkins, who won both tricks and slalom. Her victory in the overall was her second and although she also won both events in '56, she did not jump and thus passed up overall consideration.

Her performance also accounted for two of the five successful title defenses. The others were Roger Ray of Kokomo, Ind., in boys' jumping, Mike Amsbry of Orange, Calif., in boys' tricks, and Janelle Kirtley of Birmingham, Ala., in girls' slalom. (However, Amsbry and Miss Kirtley were both dethroned as 1956 overall champions.)

Last year, Chuck Stearns, winner of the boys' overall title in '55, captured the men's overall.

He also renewed his slalom duel with Charles Emry of Cypress Gardens, Fla., and emerged with the title. Emry won the '54 boys' slalom; Stearns won it in '55. Then advancing to the men's division, Emry took the '56 men's slalom only to lose it again to Stearns last year.

Last year's tourney also saw newcomer Nancy Rideout of Cypress Gardens, Fla., sail over the former title holder, Mrs. Sandra (Sandy) Lecklider of Grosse Point, Mich., to a new championship and the setting of a new world record.

Nancy's teammate, Joe Cash, also from Cypress Gardens, Fla., and also making his debut in the nationals, followed her ramprocketing record-making performance by setting a new meet record and tying the world record jump mark of 126 feet.

Another upset last year, came when Henry Holmes of West Palm Beach, Fla., splashed cold water on Jack Andresen's veteran's overall title by slipping off with the slalom title after Andresen had held it for three straight years. And Andresen's twice-won tricks title crown toppled to unheralded Bill Morris of Lomita, Calif.


Roger Ray came out to San Diego from Kokomo, Ind., and dethroned Mickey Amsbry of Orange, Calif., in his own neighborhood by knocking off the boys' overall championship crown and then Glenn Sperry of Fort Worth, Texas, bumped the exchamp another notch off the top by sailing into second place.

Amsbry may have been staggered by this treatment but he wasn't out. He came through with the tricks championship by displaying a matchless performance and winning a record high total of 1,648 points.

Several straight years of competition for the girls' overall championship hasn't cooled the duel between blonde Vicki Van Hook, defending champ, and red-haired Janelle Kirtley, 1956 winner. With still two more years to go before moving up to the women's class, these two young ladies perform like the champions they are whenever they meet in competition.


Janelle launched the battle in '56 by grabbing the tricks and slalom events, capturing the overall crown. The following

Practice at Tournament

Practice regulations at the 1958 Nationals will be those approved by the American Water Ski Association under the "ticket system." This system will apply to Wednesday and Thursday, August 20 and 21, preceding the tournament. Each contestant in the jumping events shall receive a ticket entitling him to five practice jumps over the official jump. This ticket will have the competitor's name on it and must be surrendered to the practice boat driver at the time when the five jumps are made.

Similarly, each competitor in the trick events will be given a ticket entitling him to two passes over the official jump on trick skis. The practice boat driver will collect this ticket and will limit the use of it to jump practice only.

All these regulations apply to the two days immediately preceding the tournament and *only* such official practice will be permitted on those days. On any days *before this time*, the Ida Cason Callaway Gardens will permit ski practicing on the same basis as it provides for public water skiing in its regular program—boats may be rented and arrangements made with the drivers for particular types of practice. At no time will other than Gardens' or official tournament boats be permitted on the lake.

Tourney Social Schedule

A full schedule of social and meeting activities will accompany the actual skiing events at this year's Nationals. Highlight of the social calendar will be Saturday night's banquet (August 23), which will be held at the magnificent new dining and dancing pavilion at the Ida Cason Callaway Gardens' Robin Lake Beach at Pine Mountain, Ga.

The huge, breeze-swept pavilion consists of 21 giant shells which tower like enormous wineglasses from slim bases to interlock above an area half the size of a football fleld. Beneath this massive canopy are unequalled facilities for dining and recreation, shaded and protected from sun and rain. This cool and colorful beachside location, overlooking the entire tournament course, will provide a festive atmosphere for Saturday night's festivities.

Other activities connected with the Championships will be a meeting of the judges on Thursday afternoon at 3 p.m., a membership meeting of the AWSA on Thursday evening, an AWSA board meeting, plus a number of special club activities on Friday night, and the presentation of trophies on Sunday evening at the conclusion of the Tournament.

Robin Lake is Manmade

Robin Lake, the site of the 1958 National Water Ski Tournament, is the world's largest manmade lake which is ringed by a sandy beach. Sixty-five acres in area, the lake is fed primarily by mountain springs. The beach is a strip of dazzling white sand, extending more than half a mile around the shoreline of the lake.

The sand extends 50 feet above the shoreline and 120 feet out beneath the surface of the water. Up to the present, 416 railroad cars of sand have been used on the beach, which is scraped and smoothed daily and augmented from season to season.

Three bathhouses at the beach can accommodate 1,000 bathers at a time. A shaded picnic area adjacent to the beach can serve 2,500 persons at a time and a permanent parking area will accommodate 2,100 cars. Nearby overflow parking areas will take care of another 2,000 cars.

The beach-area facilities have been designed to accommodate as many as 15,000 persons.

Airport At Callaway Gardens

Skiers who wish to fly their own planes to Ida Cason Callaway Gardens to attend the 1958 National Water Ski Tournament can do so because there is a private airport on the Gardens' property. The Callaway airport, just west of the Robin Lake Beach area, has a 3.000-foot turf airstrip and maintains limited hangar space plus complete tie-down and refueling services. Transportation is available by arrangement at the airport for pilots and their families to any of the Gardens' facilities without charge.

Qualifications Changed For Mid-West Regional

Qualifications for the Mid-West Regional Championships have been changed by the AWSA in view of the short ski season in the Midwest along with inadequate facilities to rate skiers with qualifled judges. New requirements are:

- Slalom: Men 26-28; vets 24-26; all other, 20-22.
- Tricks: Men 450 points; all other, 250 points.
 - a) Must certify they have accomplished the above in any prior sanctioned AWSA meet.
 - b) Or, were in the first 20 in the '57 Mid-West.
 - c) Or, qualify on Friday, August 8, at meet site.

Winners will still be eligible for an expert or first class rating and for the Nationals.



Stockton (Calif.) Water Ski Club

Under mercifully overcast skies, a hardy band of Stockton water skiers gathered on the club beach for the season's first workday on May 10, 1958. The group, about the size of a low budget crowd scene, was, with the aid of donated equipment, able to do the work of a cast of thousands before coming to a sudden halt in midafternoon.

Leading the work party was President Chet Eccles, who described the work to be done to the group made up of Bill, Sr., Bill, Jr., and Muriel Barlow, C. R. and Randy Eccles, Bruce and Dennis Ioppini, Charlie Risso, Jim and Fred Williamson, and Stan York. Later in the day, the group was augmented by two Golden Gate Water Ski Club members who arrived in Earl Holland's boat and pitched in to aid the understaffed Stocktonians for a short while.

The plan consisted of removing brush and surface mud from a 100-foot strip of beach north of the present skiing area and covering the denuded area with a thick layer of sand removed from the center of the island. Aiding, or rather making possible, the plans were a small bulldozer and a dump truck.

After the bulldozer had cleared the area, leaving a knee-deep morass, about 30 loads of sand were carried from the center of the island by truck and spread over the saturated subsoil by the skiers. Other members mowed the heavy grass in back of the beach and around the picnic tables and gathered logs to fence in a swimming area for children.

The work was halted rather suddenly

about 3 p.m. when the left rear axle of the dump truck snapped starting from the sand.
